

I had the privilege of being in seminary with Tim, and I am glad to see that he has not lost his wit (or his wits). If you are looking for an in-depth analysis and history of the Episcopal Church, this is not the book for you. But if you want the Cliff's Notes (sorry, Tim, I'm not as technologically hip as you are) version of helpful things to know, this will definitely get you started. Tim does well translating the insider stuff for non-Episcopalians. You'll learn the difference between "episcopal," "Episcopal," and Episcopalian." You'll get some good tips on how to choose a church. You'll find out the dynamics of all kinds of committees! And, you'll hopefully discover people you want to include in your walk of faith. The book is probably even more fun for Episcopalians. It takes great skill to hold a mirror up to people and make them laugh with you at what they see. Tim has that skill. As he warns, if you take

yourself too seriously, you won't enjoy this book. But if you can take a joke, Tim can tell it, at the same time that his love of the Episcopal Church and its members shines from every page. Tim's most important gift, though, is reminding his readers that people in church--including the clergy--are just people, like everyone else in the world. They come for all kinds of reasons, some of which are not particularly noble, but God willing, together they reveal Christ alive and working in the world.

This book made me laugh throughout and Iâ Â<sup>TM</sup>m still laughing. Written for Episcopalians (not Episcopals because thereâ Â<sup>TM</sup>s no such thing) by an Episcopal priest with a sharp wit and a serious coffee addiction, it pokes fun at aspects of our church life while also serving as a real guide for regulars, newbies, and anyone interested in joining the Episcopal Church. What we find funny in this book depends entirely on how willing we are to laugh at ourselves and at the stuff that goes on in our own parishes. Yet, I can pretty much guarantee belly laughs from an incident the author refers to as â ÂœGoose Gateâ Â• on page 113. While I donâ Â<sup>TM</sup>t agree with Father Timâ Â<sup>TM</sup>s assertion that smart phone surfing during a meeting is as benign as knitting, I do agree that laughter is good for the soul.
