

We're trying to build some background information (and excitement) for the trip, and this book is a perfect way to introduce Vesuvius's eruption. It gives good, basic information and includes a glossary of terms--great for building understanding. In general, our grandkids love "the big head books" as they call them, and this is no exception.

help in reading. They are very high interest and are good for learning vocabulary, since many words are defined within the context of the sentences. Lots of interesting facts.
