Loren Long has created a truly beautiful look at the seasons with this gem. An excellent choice for story time or the classroom, the author uses a spare, sometimes lyrical text to tell a story of one little tree that is afraid to let go. All young story listeners will be able to identify with the fear of change, and will easily understand this little tree's reluctance to let go of his leaves when the seasons change and all of his fellow trees seem to be moving on without him. The book exudes an atmosphere of caring and concern as the animals wonder if the tree is feeling sick, and try to encourage him to let go. It's only when the little tree realizes that he can no longer see the sky

because his fellow trees have grown so large, that he decides to let go. The final spread provides a nice pay off as we see the little tree finally as big as his fellows and embracing the seasonal changes.Long's illustrations are quite stunning. His charming depictions of both trees and animals really pop against an abundance of white space. He perfectly conveys the changing seasons with forest scenes that make you feel the chilling cold of winter and the lushness of summer. Little Tree has a ton of personality, which is surprising as he has no features. This story will serve as an intro to seasonal change or just a fun fable about nature and letting go. Little Tree is a new classic and an enthusiastic recommend for story time, classroom use, or any young child's personal collection.

This is a simple yet meaningful story of a Little Tree who doesnâ <sup>™</sup>t want to lose its leaves. As the seasons progress, and other trees grow, the Little Tree just hugs its original leaves tight. Eventually, the tree learns that to move forward into the future, first, we have to let go of the past. This can be a complex â " and challenging â " lesson for children to learn (and even adults). My children love to hear me read this lovely fable as a bedtime story, with a reassuring lesson for my whole family, as we all face the uncertain changes and certain challenges of growing older.

I found Little Tree by Loren Long at the library. My girls love Longâ ™s â œOtisâ • books, so I brought this book for them to enjoy. Little Tree is the story of a- wait for it-little tree. He is very happy to be amongst the other trees, and loves when the animals come around to play. The weather gets colder, and the other trees shed their leaves, but Little Tree is afraid. He clings to his leaves. As the seasons change, the other trees grow taller; Little Tree stays the same size, with his brown leaves. Will Little Tree ever drop his leaves? The illustrations are bright and colorful. Long makes wonderful use of color, and itâ <sup>™</sup>s easy to tell which season it is based on the color of the leaves and by looking at the forest floor. The animals have been rendered in a realistic style. The animals are not anthropomorphic, so there is less of an emphasis on their facial expressions, but they do approach Little Tree with curiosity and concern. This was a lovely little story. I loved the theme of a celetting goâ • being a necessary part of moving on/growing up. Little Tree refuses to let go of his leaves, and so he is unable to grow. My girls were very concerned about Little Tree; â œHeâ ™s so little,â • they said. â œWhy doesnâ ™t he grow like the other trees?â •l would absolutely recommend Little Tree. This book will appeal to preschoolers and children in the early years of elementary school. There is not as much action in Little Tree as there is in Longâ ™s â œOtisâ • books, and thatâ ™s okay. This is a thoughtful and introspective book, and my girls enjoyed reading it.

This story is about a little tree that is afraid of change (to let it's leaves fall) and he holds onto them through the season, but he soon realizes he misses out on all the benefits of change. Very cute story and beautiful artwork.
